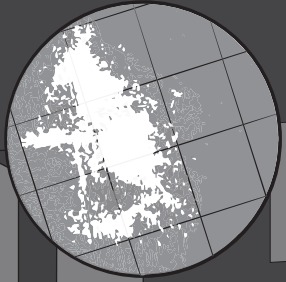
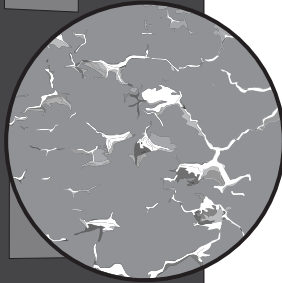


WHERE'S THE LEAD COMING FROM?

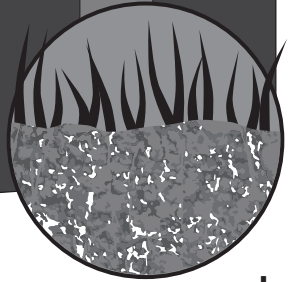

Landlords often don't inspect or abate housing before leasing to tenants.

Health departments won't intervene until a child is already positive for lead poisoning.

Yet the CDC warns there is no safe level of lead exposure.

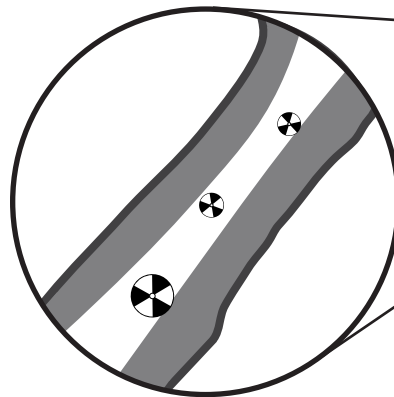
Lead, a toxic heavy metal, is present in the paint of many buildings built before 1978.

When paint degrades over time, children risk acute exposure through eating toxic paint chips. That lead also builds up in dust, which readily inhaled and ingested and is easily spread from unit to unit, person to person, even to the soil, making lead contamination a problem for the entire building.

Lead accumulates in bone, where it will stay for decades, leaching into the blood and causing many chronic health conditions.

In adults, lead poisoning can also cause high blood pressure, joint and muscle pain, and miscarriage.

Children absorb lead faster than adults and are at higher risk of lead poisoning, but lead is still dangerous to everyone.

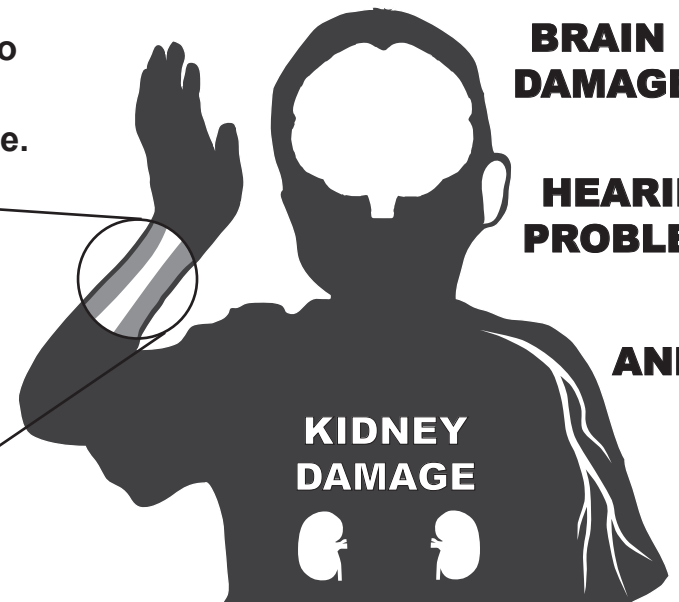

CARGILL TENANTS UNION



Though lead regulations have existed for decades, the “affordable” Cargill Falls complex opened half-finished with acute health hazards.



Through the pressure of a rent strike, the Cargill Tenants Union won:

- JAN 2023 Lead inspections of all units with children
- MAR-APR 2023 Abatement of those units
- NOV 2023 Comprehensive lead inspection of the entire building
- MAR 2024 EPA-issued order for immediate lead abatement

When state oversight fails to keep tenants safe from negligent, greedy landlords, direct collective action is necessary.

Our strength is in numbers and solidarity. By joining together as a tenant union, we can win safe housing and withstand retaliation.

TENANT ORGANIZING WORKS
